Dear Scholarship Committee:

My name is Kristen Curley, and I am currently a Freshman at Sacred Heart Academy, an all girls' high school in Hempstead, Long Island. Although I have attended only public schools prior to this year, I am happy with my choice to spend the next four years at a Catholic school, which emphasizes not only academics, but the development of character, compassion and leadership. In fact, the motto of Sacred Heart Academy is "Lead with Heart".

I have ben blessed by God with many things, not the least of which is my singing voice. For five years, I was a Soprano with my church's Girls' Choir. Although warming up our voices in the Church basement at 7:00 am (before Sunday's 8am Masses) was sometimes a struggle, the early morning services at which our Choir sang were always the best attended. I feel participating in the Choir was a way I gave thanks to God for giving me my vocal talents.

Before starting high school this past September, I auditioned and was accepted into Sacred Heart Academy's Chamber Choir. Practice is twice a week after school, and we are currently preparing a holiday concert. In December, we will perform this program for retired nuns, nursing home residents, disabled veterans and others in need of holiday cheer. From my previous Choir experiences, I know how such a small thing such as singing can delight the performer as well as the audience. Seeing the listeners' smiling faces, and hearing some sing along, is heart-warming, and all the gratification I need.

Outside of school and church, I have been active with the Girl Scouts for many years, and am now preparing for my Gold Award. The Scout activities involving community service have always been the most rewarding for me. Annually our troop: sends Christmas stockings filled with goodies to soldiers overseas, sings carols to nursing home residents during the Advents season, as well as makes and distributes Easter baskets to underprivileged children during Lent.

This year my Girl Scout troop received the Silver Award. This group award is an acknowledgement for the development and completion of a service that benefits the local community. My troop chose to make "Surgi-dolls", which were later donated to hospitals in Nassau and Queens Counties. These handmade, Initially faceless stuffed dolls, are used by child life specialists to educate pediatric patients as to what will happen to their bodies while they are asleep in the Operating Room. These dolls are not only meant to aide in the the understanding of medical procedures, but also act to comfort and distract children during a very anxious time (pre-operatively). After each patient selects a gift doll, the child is given markers and encouraged to draw and color their doll's own unique facial features. Then the doll is used by a hospital staff member to briefly describe what the youngster can expect the surgeon to do to make them better again, as well as answer any questions the child may have.

To make the dolls, each eighth grade girl learned how to: use sewing scissors to cut material, stitch the material together, and stuff them via a small remaining opening in the sewn material. After the stuffing was added and the hole stitched closed, the "Surgi-dolls" were ready for delivery. In the end, our troop donated hundreds of dolls to the Pediatric Surgery division of two Medical Centers. Looking back, I feel this experience taught me how even small (individual) steps, when combined as a group, can be used to accomplish a larger goal. By each Scout making a small number of dolls each month for a year, the troop succeeded in filling a great need in local hospitals.

My Catholic education has been an extremely formative experience for me thus far, and I am excited to continue along this academic journey. I thank you for the opportunity to be considered for your scholarsip.



Blessed Adolph Kolping's Story

The rise of the factory system in 19th-century Germany brought many single men into cities where they faced new challenges to their faith. Father Adolph Kolping began a ministry to them, hoping that they would not be lost to the Catholic faith, as was happening to workers elsewhere in industrialized Europe.

Born in the village of Kerpen, Adolph became a shoemaker at an early age because of his family's economic situation. Ordained in 1845, he ministered to young workers in Cologne, establishing a choir, which by 1849 had grown into the Young Workmen's Society. A branch of this began in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1856. Nine years later there were over 400 *Gesellenvereine* (workman's societies) around the world. Today this group has over 450,000 members in 54 countries across the globe.

More commonly called the Kolping Society, it emphasizes the sanctification of family life and the dignity of labor. Father Kolping worked to improve conditions for workers and greatly assisted those in need. He and St. John Bosco in Turin had similar interests in working with young men in big cities. He told his followers, "The needs of the times will teach you what to do." Father Kolping once said, "The first thing that a person finds in life and the last to which he holds out his hand, and the most precious that he possesses, even if he does not realize it, is family life."

He and Blessed John Duns Scotus are buried in Cologne's Minoritenkirche, originally served by the Conventual Franciscans. The Kolping Society's international headquarters are across from this church.

Kolping members journeyed to Rome from Europe, America, Africa, Asia and Oceania for Father Kolping's beatification in 1991, the 100th anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's revolutionary encyclical "Rerum Novarum" ("On the Social Order"). Father Kolping's personal witness and apostolate helped prepare for that encyclical.

Reflection

Some people thought that Father Kolping was wasting his time and talents on young working men in industrialized cities. In some countries, the Catholic Church was seen by many workers as the ally of owners and the enemy of workers. Men like Adolph Kolping showed that was not true.

"The Flying Dutchman"

One of our greatest baseball players was, indirectly, honored when his picture card was recently auctioned off for nearly 5 million dollars.

Honus Wagner played 21 seasons (1897-1917) almost entirely for the Pittsburgh Pirates. The "Sweet Caporal Cigarette Company" featured, with their smokes, a picture of one of the most popular baseball players". Wagner, however, was a non-smoker and did not want to promote the "habit" among the public and requested his photo be withdrawn from this advertisement. In total, only 50 photo cards went into circulation and they are extremely rare. Wagner was named the "Flying Dutchman" because of his fleet footedness rounding the bases. Actually, the name war originally referred to a phantom sea captain from Holland, who menaced mariners in the 1700s around the Cape of Good Hope. The pirate was caught but the term lingered on. In the 1800s the number of German immigrants in America soared. They were mistaken for Dutch because of its close sounding to Deutsch, the German word for Germans. Hence Honus Wagner-a German-Americanwas designated "The Flying Dutchman".

'Holy Grail' of baseball cards up for auction

The world's most expensive baseball card has hit the auction block, and sports fans in Manhattan scored a peek at it Friday.

The extremely rare 1909 Honus Wagner — which experts have called the "Holy Grail" of sports memorabilia — is expected to fetch up to \$5 million in an online auction ending Oct 1, said Ken Goldin, founder of Goldin Auctions.

"In the world of sports, it is the single most wellknown, iconic symbol in the industry. He was the greatest shortstop of all time," said Goldin, who put the card on display at the Yankees-themed restaurant NYY Steak in Midtown on Friday.

Only about 50 copies of the uniquely shaped and textured card featuring the Pittsburgh Pirates player were ever printed, Goldin and other experts have said.

In 1911, Wagner demanded that production of the card be halted because it was printed by the American Tobacco Company and sold in cigarette packs, which Wagner thought was bad for kids, Goldin said.

"On the back of the card was a big ad that said 'tobacco." He didn't want to promote tobacco." Goldin said.

Few of the cards, which feature a white border and an orange background, are in good condition now, said Doug Drotman, a Goldin spokesman.

"Now 47 of the 50 cards look like a dog chewed them up. This is the second-highestgraded one, in terms of condition," Drotman said.

A smaller version of the card was once owned by NHL hockey legend Wayne Gretzky and Arizona Diamondbacks owner Ken Kendrick.

The type of card now on the block, known as the "Jumbo Wagner," last sold for \$2.1 million in 2013, Drotman said. The highest bid on the card Friday was \$1.8 million.

"It's a really great time to invest in baseball cards. Values have been escalating rapidly," he said.

Wagner played 21 seasons in Major League Baseball from 1897 to 1917, almost entirely for the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The speedster was erroneously nicknamed "The Flying Dutchman." He was German, not Dutch,
