Stories of Interest

THE MURDER OF THE CENTURY submitted by Martin A. Kelly [Suniay News, 6/19/11]



Germans constitute the largest immigrant group in America, so, it is not surprising that some are found in every field of endeavor including crime; even when the offense is murder.

The summer of 1897 was sweltering. The best relief for kiddles was an ice cream cone, for adults, a cold beer. But, a few hardles took advantage of nature's swimming pools, the East River, and went over the side of the docks. Two swimmers spotted a package floating off-shore; and, anxiously tugged it onto land. It contained the limbs of a male human.

Two more morbid packages were found in the river and a third one in Isham Park. Since the head had not been recovered (forensic science was in its infancy) the only lead was the gaudy oilcloth used for wrapping. By pains-taking investigation, detectives traced that pattern from the wholesaler—to the distributors—to the retailer—to the purchasers. Through the process of elimination, the

list of suspects narrowed to one person: Mrs. Nach, a mid-wife who rented in a house in Woodside, Queens.

Around her home, there was run off filled with fluid when rain had not fallen for a week. The wastewater from the cottage had formed a blood-red puddle beneath its bathtub drainpipe. Ducks that touched down on the surface flew away with pink colored dorsal feathers.

Detectives interviewed Mrs. Nach; but, she maintained her innocence. One of the detectives, a licensed plumber, noticed something awry about the kitchen sink. He dismantled the elbow joint wherein he discovered a reddish residue with the stench of death.

The Tablotd Newspapers exploited the tragedy with "extra" editions and elaborate editorials. They served, at best, to get the public involved. Nach's neighbors informed on her saying she had two tenants who served as her paramours. A dispute broke out between them and Thorn threw his competition, Guldensuppe out of the house. In revenge, Guldensuppe threatened to report Nach as a part time abortionist. "We can't have this!" Mrs. Nach thought and contrived Guldensuppe's death and disposal of his body parts.

Thorn felt uneasy, after the fact, and confided in a fellow barber, John Gotha. Not wanting to be involved in someone else's dirty business, Gotha called the police and they picked up Thorn. He and Mrs. Nach were indicted and put on trial for murder.

While obviously the instigator, Mrs. Nach changed her plea of "not Guilty" to one of being an accessory. The jury bought it and condemned Thorn for Guldensuppe's murder while giving Mrs. Nach, the "femme fatale," as they are called, a 10 year sentence.

The sensational newspaper coverage given this crime launched a new era of journalism called "yellow journalism" because they are written in an inflammatory style: it is even seen today.

LENTEN SPRING CLEANING

During the forty days of Lent, we prepare for the holy days of the Triduum and the great feast of Easter. Traditionally, this is time for spring cleaning, which has its roots in the Jewish Passover tradition of getting rid of any trace of chametz (food with yeast or other leavening). Only unleavened bread is eaten during Passover in memory of the Flight from Egypt, when there wasn't time to let leavened bread rise. In Jewish tradition, leaven came to represent pride, haughtiness, and egotism. In Christian tradition, churches and houses are swept and polished, catechumens' white baptismal robes are prepared, and new Easter clothes are purchased. But Lent is a time to get our inner house in order as well. Here are some ideas for your Lenten spring cleaning.

Spring Cleaning: Getting Our House in Order

- Schedule a household spring cleaning day. If there are children in the household, assign (or draw out of a hat) a chore for each. Play music. Give compliments for jobs well done, have a snack, and sing a song.
- · Clean closets: take usable clutter to a charity thrift store.
- Polish candlesticks for Easter candlelight; make decorations for the Easter dinner table (keep them aside until Holy Saturday).
- Start or renew a household prayer tradition (Bible study, rosary, Stations of the cross, bedtime prayers).

Reconciliation: Getting Our Relationships Cleaned Up During Lent, as catechumens are preparing for baptism, we all prepare to renew our baptismal vows through penance and reconciliation. This season of reconciliation is a time to restore our relationship with God, our household, and neighbors. Here are some ways to enter into the healing spirit of this season.

- · Participate in the sacrament of reconciliation
- Apologize to someone you have hurt; forgive someone who has hurt you.
- Do an examination of conscience (reviewing how you have lived as a Christian throughout the day) before going to bed at night.
