#### A NEW WAY OF MAILING THE BULLETIN



## Stories of Interest

## ANNA SCHAEFFER submitted by Martin A. Kelly



The pomp and pageantry of the recent elevation of two American bishops to the office of Cardinal nearly obscured a note of epic praise. Pope Benedict XVI announced that he would name seven new saints on October 21st. Among them are three women, of whom one was a German lay mystic.

Anna Schaeffer was born near Regensberg in Bavaria, Feb. 18, 1882; and, her life was anything but a "bed of roses." One of the eldest of a large family, the responsibility of helping to bring up her younger siblings became hers when her father died prematurely. She had wanted to be a missionary; now, at the age of 19, she had to be one of the "bread winners."

One afternoon in 1896, in a laundry at Stammham, a tragic accident occurred which would handicap her for life. She fell into a tub of boiling detergent and sustained 3rd degree burns over much of her body.

After a year in a hospital, she was discharged with "no hope." Skin grafts had not been heard of; there was no way to heal her burns. She was bed ridden for the rest of her life in a state of racking discomfort.

She resolved to make the best of it. Fervently, she prayed and received the Blessed Sacrament daily. It would seem some gifts of the Holy Spirit expressed themselves through her. Writers from Austria, Switzerland, America, and her home land wrote her seeking her advice and intercession. She had many visions and apparitions and was credited with working miracles, carrying on an apostolate from her bedside. In addition, she crocheted altar cloths of the Sacred Heart of Jesus which she distributed freely. She was called home on October 5, 1925 and her grave site became a popular pilgrimage mission. In spite of her grievous pain, she never lost sight of her responsibility to help others through her counsel and insight.


