Theobald J. Dengler IX is a Bronx boy. His grandfather and grandmother emigrated from the Rhineland. Ted's father was born in Manhattan. Ted Dengler along with his father were one of a small group that founded the Steuben Parade in 1957. Ted has been serving the German American community, starting as a Boy Scout in Yorkville Kolping Troop 636 from tender foot up to Committee Chairman, for 27 years.

He went to school in the Bronx. After Fordham College he completed law school and was admitted to the NY Bar in 1954. He joined his father in the practice of law later joined by his brothers, Norbert and Laurence, and his sister, Hilda.

After serving in the US Army in the Judge Advocate Section in Orleans, France, he returned to the law firm concentrating on wills, real estate and not for profit corporations. He served on the Board of the Catholic Lawyers Guild.

He married Ema, a Yorkville girl, and they have four children. It's a wonder they ever saw him because he was active in many German American organizations, and attending the functions of other German American organizations and Vereins.

As President of the Kolping Society of New York, he was Chairman of their summer home in Montrose on the Hudson and served as their legal advisor.

In 1957 he was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Leo House for German Catholic Immigrants where he served until 2002 as Secretary, Vice President and President for over 50 years.

With the New York Turn Verein he began in 1966 and served on the Board of Advisors of the American Turners Foundation of New York.

He continued to be active in the Steuben Parade, serving as Treasurer from 1957 to 1990. In 2009 he was honored by being one of their Grand Marshalls of the parade.



Even when serving as Treasurer and then Chairman (President) of the German American Committee of Greater New York, he served on the Board of Trustees of the Isabella Geriatric Center from 1965 to 1988, first as Secretary and then as Vice President.

In 1978 he received the Medal for Distinguished Service in Catholic Organizations from Terence Cardinal Cooke, Mayor Ed Koch awarded him the Mayoral Ethnic Service Medal in 1988. In 1996 he was invested into the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre.

Many of you know it is not just the organizations one belongs to and their meetings that one must attend, but the functions and activities of supporting organizations as well. Ted and often Ema were to be seen at German American concerts, banquets and affairs.

Ted was a Renaissance man: a voracious reader, a love of the outdoors from scouting, skiing, and backpacking up Mt. Marcy, New York's highest point. He loved his summer home at the beach and his boat for exploring and fishing. He loved music, especially choral singing. From Boys Choir to college Glee Club to the Rockefeller Center Chorus, Ted was in it. Hindered only by hours spent in German American and Catholic activities.

He will be missed by his wife Ema, children Theobald X, Joan Smyth, Lisa and Peter Carruthers, Veronica and Theodore Coletti and Katrina, his grandchildren Theobald XI, Allison, Phillip, Sabrina and Travis. He will also be missed by his brothers Norbert and Bernard, along with his many nieces and nephews.

May the angels lead him into paradise.

We are now in the month of June. We will soon be coming to the close of the year for priests, called by our Holy Father Benedict XVI, last June. It has been a year in which priests have been asked to renew their commitment of holiness and service. And, all who make up the Church, have been asked to pray for priests in a special way.

The year has served, as well, as an opportunity to encourage prayers for priestly vocations. The year has served those who have already responded to the invitation and are now in formation in seminaries. When people wish to destroy religion, they begin by attacking the priest, because where there is no longer any priest, there is no sacrifice. And, where there is no longer any sacrifice, there is no religion.

The priesthood is the love of the Heart of Jesus. When you see the priest, think of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Stories of Interest

SISTER EDITH STEIN submitted by Martin A. Kelly



The holocaust is very much in the news to prove man's inhumanity to his fellow man. Our closest victim, as Catholics, is our Sister-in-Christ, Sister Edith Stein.

She was born in 1895, in Breslau, Prussia, to an observant Jewish family. Her childhood was unremarkable, except she was obsessed with the purpose of human existence. She left her university studies at Göttingen to serve as an army nurse aide when World War 1 broke out.

After her discharge, she resumed her philosophical studies at the University of Freiburg and was awarded her doctorate in philosophy Suma Cum Laude. She later became the assistant and collaborator of Professor Husserl, the famous founder of phenomenology, who greatly appreciated her brilliant mind.

In the midst of all her studies, Edith Stein was searching not only for the truth, but for Truth itself and she found both in the Catholic Church, after reading the autobiography of Saint Teresa of Avila. She was baptized on New Year's Day, 1922.

By 1933, the National Socialists had seized power and one of their first moves was to prohibit Jews from teaching. Edith had already become a nun and entered the Carmelite Order; but, she was not safe even behind convent walls.

On the night of 31 December 1938, she secretly crossed the border into Holland where she was warmly received in the Carmel of Echt. There she wrote her last work, The Science of the Cross. Her own Cross was just ahead of her, for the Nazis had invaded neutral Holland, and when the Dutch bishops issued a pastoral letter protesting the deportation of the Jews and the expulsion of Jewish children from the Catholic school system, the Nazis arrested all Catholics of Jewish extraction in Holland. Edith and her sister were sent to Auschwitz where they met their deaths.

Why was not more done to stop the holocaust? One answer is; "human weakness." That is what Jesus exclaimed when he left the Garden of Gethsemane, after praying, and found his disciples on guard duty asleep (Mark: 114.30).

St. Peter, the chief apostle, denied Jesus three times after his arrest and before the crucifixion (John 18:18). Later St. Peter attempted to flee Rome after the start of the persecution of Christians by the Roman Emperors. Peter met the vision of Jesus when walking toward Rome. Peter greeted him "Where are you going, Master?" (Quo Vadis, Domine?) Jesus explained that if his right hand man could not stand up to what he knew was right, his passion and death were in vain. St. Peter returned and accepted the dire consequence. (James. 333). Coincidentally, little record exists that pagans and others protested the persecution of Christians by the Romans (AD 60-376).
