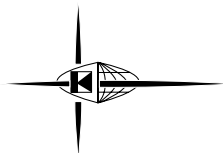

Priest shot while trying to 'do some good'

A Catholic priest tried to talk some sense into a man involved in a street-corner drug deal yesterday in Queens — and ended up with a bullet for his efforts.

Father Damien Ekete was waiting for a cab outside the Habibi Gourmet Deli on Rockaway Boulevard in Jamaica at around 12:15 a.m. when he noticed a few men acting suspiciously nearby, law-enforcement sources said. Cops say a drug deal appeared to be going down.

Ekete — who was on his way back to his Bronx rectory after attending a party in the Queens neighborhood — walked over to one of the men and began talking to him about his dangerous lifestyle, sources said.

Suddenly, a green Nissan Altima pulled up, and someone inside fired off a round at the man top whom Ekete was talking.

But the shooter missed his intended target and instead hit the priest in his right biceps, sources said.

"It sounds like he went over to them to do some good, and he got shot," a law-enforcement source said of Ekete.

Ekete, a 49-year-old Nigerian native who has worked at the Church of the Holy Spirit in Morris Heights, The Bronx, for five years, walked 10 minutes to the St. Clement Pope Church on 123rd Avenue, according to a nearby church employee who spoke to police about the incident.

But nobody was at St. Clement, so the priest walked back to a gas station on Rockaway Boulevard for help.

He was taken to Jamaica Hospital for treatment and then discharged around noon dressed in black suit pants and a blue short-sleeved hospital shirt that showed his bandaged right arm. He was flanked by two plainclothes cops.

After Ekete was interviewed at the 106th Precinct, police dropped him off at his Bronx church. He remained in the rectory for the rest of the evening.

During Mass there Sunday, the Rev. Ricardo Fajardo informed the congregation about the incident in his sermon.

"We are all praying for his recovery," Fajardo said.

Church volunteer Brian Bonnah, 21, added, "I know a stray bullet has no respect for who it's going to hit, but the fact that it's our priest, it makes me feel uneasy. I guess anything can happen in Jamaica, Queens."

Timothy Cardinal Dolan was notified about the shooting but was not able to visit the injured priest because he was in St. Louis with his mom for Mother's Day, a rep for the archdiocese said.

"It was not a more serious or life-threatening injury, thanks be to God," said the spokesman, Joseph Zwilling.

Gloria McSweeney, Dave & Peggy Dougall and I did our annual act of mercy. Of about 20+ hours we pulled and pulled and pulled out the weeds and Gloria decided on the plants to purchase for all around, etc.

Remember all the rain we had for days back in April? Richie Pavalonis and us ladies saw that the 4 or 5 Eastern Red Cedar had these oranges thingies all over (see pic). What was it? Flowers or fungus?

Gloria snapped a branch and took it to a nursery. They researched and identified it as Cedar Apple Rust, a complex disease. It is brought on as *Gymnospos Angium Juniper-Virginanae* spread from a host apple tree and can spread about 5 miles. Luckily Rich clipped away and the sun returned which killed this fungus.

I planted a Rhubarb plant down at the end in the swimming pool area. In 2017 the ladies at Kolping will be baking their Rhubarben Kuchen.

The deer feasted again on the ArborVitae in the barrels which surround the lake. Richie vows he will have to fence them in the Fall to protect them like he fences in the 2 Colorado Blue Spruce trees for Bill Gessner and Fritz Scheuermann.

KOH offers such splendid river views and the property is so beautiful, attracting birds, animals, and bees. Such a quiet retreat for the city dwellers and members.

A SERIAL KILLER IN NAZI BERLIN submitted by Martin A. Kelly



Out of the crucible of World War II came one of the most bizarre tales of murder, mayhem and madness. On September 1, 1939, Europe went to war for the second time within 25 years. Great numbers of men and weapons were transferred to the fighting fronts, but little concern was given to the “home front.”

It was around this same time that Paul Ogorzow, age 28, preyed on female war workers on the evening shift. The scene of the first four murders was the home gardens near the complex where he lived with his wife and two children.

The war created a great demand for food and most available land was converted into a “victory garden.” In the darkness of the mandatory blackouts, Ogorzow lurked behind bushes and trees awaiting his victims.

As a senior railway employee, he learned of the police’s counter-measures. So he switched his *modus operandi* to assaults on passengers on trains. In the later murders, of which there were four, the female bodies were tossed off moving trains.

The arrest of the serial killer was hampered by Nazi ideology. According to their theory of racial superiority, they believed the murderer had to be an “Untermensch” (a person considered racially or socially inferior). They wasted time and effort by focusing their investigation on gypsies, Jews and other minorities, with no results.

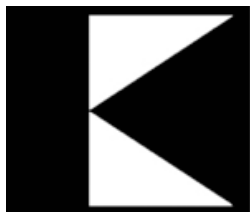
Finally the KRIPO (Kriminal Polizei) was allowed to go public with the murders. Permission had been withheld because it would have reflected poorly on the image of Nazi efficiency.

A co-worker of Ogorzow noted he left his work place on several occasions and returned without explanation. He was called in for questioning by Georg Heuser, ace sleuth of the KRIPO, who realized he had struck gold on the murder cases. Ogorzow’s alibis were in tatters.

Indicted for eight murders, Ogorzow pleaded clemency on grounds he was a “party member” for 15 years. The court held that the plea was immaterial and condemned him for premeditated murder. Two weeks after he was arrested, Ogorzow was executed by guillotine at the Plötzensee Prison. His family was obliged to pay the execution charge of 300 Reichsmarks.
