PAPAL VISIT TO MADRID FOR WORLD YOUTH DAY 2011 submitted by Jack McGee

From all over the world, thousands of Catholic young adults, from 16 year olds to those in their early 30's, will converge on Madrid (Spain), August 16-21. The occasion: World Youth Day 2011, an intensive week of daily worship, catechesis, renewal and fellowship. Accompanied by their bishops, and convened by the Bishop of Rome, Pope Benedict XVI, they will witness to the vitality of Catholic Faith, today and tomorrow. Pope Benedict XVI announced the theme for the 2011 Youth Day some three years ago: "Rooted and Built Up on Jesus Christ, Firm in the Faith" (Colossians 2:7). He also asked prayerful preparation for 2011 through local and national World Youth gatherings in 2009 and 2010, each year centered on related themes: "We have set our hope on the Living God" (from St. Paul's First Letter to Timothy) and "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" (Mark 10:17)

At the heart of the World Youth Day themes: A Catholic's faith is based on the experience of building and nurturing a lifelong relationship with Jesus Christ, a true friendship that is rooted in prayer and encounters the Lord in the Gospels and Sacraments, most especially in Holy Eucharist. For it is in the Holy Eucharist, Pope Benedict emphasizes, that young people find the Lord is "present and close to us," the Savior and friend who "even becomes food for our journey."

World Youth Day participants, together with their bishops, will welcome the Pope on August 18. Thereafter, they will endeavor to keep pace, as Pope Benedict XVI teaches, hears their concerns, blesses, and finally commissions these young people as modern day apostles. He will urge these young adults to preach the Gospel in the only way evangelization has ever been effective—by living the Gospel as members of Christ's Mystical Body on earth. Try to pray daily this summer for the success of this joyful World Youth Day 2011.

Among notes of interest: Credited with founding World Catholic Youth Day, the late and newly beatified Blessed Pope John Paul II was named one of the official patrons for the 2011 World Youth Day. The latter, growing out of Pope John Paul II's call to Catholic Youth worldwide to meet and pray with him in Rome, marking the closing of the Holly Year (19984), and again in 1985, observing the UN's International Year of Youth.

Stories of Interest

AMELIA STAFFELDT - Slay gives birth to K-9 unit submitted by Martin A. Kelly



What did Jungfrau (virgin) St. Marie Goretti and Amelia Staffeldt have in common? They lived about the same time (1890-1902), (1892-1907); the former in Nettuno, Italy, and the latter in rural Elmhurst, Queens; but, the fact that connects them is that they were both murdered protecting their chastity.

Brutalized Marie was livid on her arrival at the local hospital and was able to identify her perpetrator whom she forgave. Thirty years later, upon his release from prison, he added his efforts to the movement to canonize Marie, which was accomplished January 24, 1950.

Amelia, a Roman-Catholic, German-American, is among the unlisted saints. Her death was instantanneous after a sex-fiend pounced on her as she tilled the soil of her father's farm. In spite of sincere police efforts, there were no witnesses and forensic science was in its infancy, Amelia's killer eluded capture.

To prevent a re-occurrence of this travesty of justice, the police turned to man's oldest friend: the dog. Lieutenant George Wakefield, P.O.N.Y. was dispatched to

Belgium to fetch five dogs for police training. These five canines were the originators of the police K-9 corps which includes several blood hounds and many German shepherds. Besides supplementing patrol, dogs are now used to sniff out bombs, drugs, and other contraband, make rescues, search-and-find of buried survivors and deceased, and other security functions.

Sometimes, good comes out of tragedy: The K-9 corps is Amelia's legacy.

Vatican II — 50 Years Later submitted by Jack McGee

To understand the Second Vatican Council—whose fiftieth anniversary is approaching later this year—a brief explanation of the Council of Trent and Vatican I, which preceded it, is helpful.

The Council of Trent opened in December of 1545 and concluded its work eighteen years later, in December of 1563. It spanned the pontificates of three popes. The first, Pope Paul III, noted at the time that the state of "the Church was rent and torn asunder by schism, dissension and heresies." The Council of Trent, which followed on the heels of the Protestant Reformation, is commonly referred to as the Catholic Counter Reformation. It dealt primarily with issues of reform and doctrine. In an effort, in the pope's words, "to guide and govern the bark of Peter"— to rescue the Church from future turmoil—the Council all but redefined the Church. For some, Trent is spoken of as one of the most important councils as it responded with urgency to the negative forces which sought to undermine fundamental teachings of the Roman Catholic Church.

Except for Vatican I (1869-1870), which defined papal infallibility and dealt with problems of rationalism, liberalism, and materialism, it could be said that little change occurred within the Roman Catholic Church until Vatican II, some 450 years following the Council of Trent.

Aggiornamento—the hallmark of the Second Vatican Council called by Pope John XXIII in 1962—simply meant that the Church must be brought up-to-date and adapt itself to meet the challenging conditions of modern times.

From 1962 to 1966, the Council succeeded in promulgating sixteen decrees. Perhaps the decree which most affected the universal life of the laity was that on the Liturgy. Introduction of the vernacular into the liturgy, the repositioning of the altar, and the celebrant facing the people, were among the more notable and more memorable changes that took place. In addition, recognition given to the role of the laity dramatically changed the life of many Roman Catholics.

The decrees which most affected the ministry of the Franciscans Friars of the Atonement are the Unitatis Redintegratio (Decree on Ecumenism), and Nostrae Aetate (In Our Time). The latter focused its attention on world religions with a special emphasis on Jews and Muslims, while the former opened new ways of working with Protestant, Anglican, and Orthodox Christians for the primary purpose of promoting the unity of the Christian church. These decrees signaled a new era of interfaith relations and ecumenical initiatives that continues today.

Both decrees were truly prophetic and have since occupied immense amounts of time, energy, and resources within the Roman Catholic Church. Each led to the establishment of a Pontifical Council within the Vatican, one for Promoting Christian Unity and relations with the Jews and the other, the Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue. Both offices are a significant and important presence within the Vatican and signal to the world that the Church is serious about these matters.

The Friars are well-known for our ecumenical and interfaith activities. In many ways, Unitatis Redintegratio and Nostrae Aetate validate and give continuing importance to our work. Today, we see a growing importance in both these areas, especially as we see and hear Pope Benedict's commitment to ecumenism and interfaith dialogue.

The approaching anniversary of Vatican II reminds us that, with the help of the Holy Spirit, great accomplishments have occurred and even more, much more, is yet to be achieved. Your continued prayers remain an essential contribution to these goals.
