Stories of Interest

Ferdinand Schumacker submitted by Martin A. Kelly



Did you know that the American farmers grow over one billion bushels of oats annually? Or that each acre, here, yields about 31 bushels; while in certain Western European countries (Denmark and Holland), through intensive cultivation, the yield per acre is closer to 70 bushels? This is something for world leaders to remember in case of a future food shortage. But did you know a German-American is largely responsible for the popularity and variety of this food staple in the American diet? Ferdinand Schumacker was born in Celle, Germany in 1822; and he immigrated to America in 1850 bringing with him integrity and foresight.

After a stint in farming, he opened a grocery store in Akron, Ohio. He pondered on ways to make oats, fit for human consumption. Oats were chiefly used as fodder. In 1854, he invented a chopper which made tiny cubes of oats. He, also, made a processor to precook oats and run them through rollers so they flaked-off; thus becoming rolled oats.

A non-smoker and a non drinker, Schumacker was an advocate of prohibition. He also was a fervid church-goer. One night his faith was put to a test when his mill was almost completely burnt down. In dire need of capital, he was tempted to break with his beliefs when a local brewer offered to buy the remainder of his unscorched grain. He resisted the offer and started anew, faithful (kerngesund) as before.

With mergers, he expanded his milling operations and formed the American Cereal Company, which eventually became the Quaker Oats Company. At the height of his success, he was the largest cereal manufacturer in the world. He died in 1908.

The July 2012 World Choir Games were held in Cincinnati (the first time this event was held in the U.S.). An event nicknamed "The Olympics of Choral Music", 362 choirs from 64 countries attend. The games are held every two years in a different city and country. It takes 4,600 volunteers to run the 200 events, and some Cincinnati Kolping members signed up as choir guides and interpreters. It was hard work, but worthwhile, as it was a once-in-a-lifetime eperience to be involved in such a grand spectacle.
