## **ANCHORAGES FOR HUDSON RIVER?**

Submitted by Betty Reitter & Ann Hemsing (from the Putnam-Northern Westchester EXPRESS).

This may be of special interest to our Kolping members who live in the Hudson Valley. The Coast Guard is floating the idea of adding more places for commercial vessels to drop anchor on the Hudson River. Ten locations between Yonkers and Kingston have been chosen as potential anchorages, including sites at Tomkins Cove and Montrose. The Coast Guard is asking for public feedback on the plan, which officials said is meant to make river traffic safer and more efficient. Comments must be sent to the agency by September 7th. "The public is encouraged to participate in this rule-making process," Commander Ellis Moose, chief of prevention in the New York sector, said in a statement. "We are in the preliminary, exploratory phase of this process. We understand this proposed rule-making expands beyond the maritime community and welcome feedback from local stakeholders living around the Hudson River."

# Stories of Interest

## 1895 GERMAN PRIDE **PARADE** submitted by Martin A. Kelly

In the 1890s, the question of whether one could keep the Sabbath (Sunday) holy and enjoy an alcoholic drink divided New York State.

Those from upstate New York, mostly farmers and fundamentalists said "no", and sponsored the prohibitive "Sunday Excise Law."

New York City and other southern communities believed in lax regulations on Sunday drinking. The enforcers of this code had a vested interest in the sale of "Sunday booze" - graft. The New York City legislators voted for the "Sunday Excise Law", not out of holiness-more laws to enforce, meant more money to collect.

Ironically, the "Reform" or "Clean Government Party" won the election of 1894. They were dedicated to rooting out corruption: This meant no sale of alcohol in New York State, particularly, New York City. The chief enforcer was Theodore Roosevelt (1858-1919) still to become elected Vice President (1896) and President (1900).

This change of events drove a hardship on the vast majority of European immigrants who were used to "ein Stein Bier" or "un poco de vino" with Sunday dinner. German-Americans were the second largest ethnic group in New York City and their leadership determined a show of protest was called for against this "dry" legislation. On September 15th, the marchers stepped off.

The parade, which took two hours to pass by, was a spectacular demonstration of Teutonic irony. Flagstaffs and building facades were draped with purple bunting, symbolizing the death of the "Continental Sunday." The advance guard consisted of a dozen bicyclists with blue noses and bunches of whiskers under their chins, impersonating upstate "hayseed" legislators. Some thirty thousand marchers followed on in leather trousers, Bismarck helmets, and other ethnic paraphernalia. Saloonkeepers rolled by in open carriages, waving bottles of Rhine wine and a poster declaiming, "T'aint Sunday." A gilt wagon carried a pretty Fraülein veiled in black, as the mourning Goddess of Liberty. She looked bewildered when Roosevelt loudly applauded her. Another float, labeled "The Millionaire's Club," showed three dresssuited aristocrats—one with prominent teeth and spectacles swigging champagne, while behind them two policemen arrested a beer-drinker in working clothes. "As this float passed," reported The World, "Mr. Roosevelt looked serious."

Vowing he would not relax the "blue law" on alcohol, Roosevelt realized how many voters he had alienated and worked to get a variance. Justice was done. German-Americans had stood tall and proud..
