

SUMMER HOMES OF NEW YORK KOLPING—PRELIMINARY DRAFT OF A HISTORY

This is begun completely from memory, without research, or consultations. It is the hope of this scrivener to inspire others who know dates, names and slips of stories to also write them out or at least tell the facts they know to me. In fact what started it was a challenge from Bernard Preisser (the incurable agitator) when we met at a recent wake. He said all the history of the society is being buried with the old members, that I should write what I know of Kolping on Hudson before it goes into the grave.

Well the story of KOH, the second summer home is difficult to comprehend without knowing how Kolping got into the summer home idea in the first place. The first place of course was Greenwich. It was before the beginning of WW2 that a few members thought that Fr. Kolping's share of a home for young workingmen was working well, but times were changing. Our society had a Boy Scout troop at the time. Families were actually the backbone of New York society and the house and 88th St. was fine for meetings, dances, socials, etc. but everything stopped for the summer. Therefore, we needed a summer home.

Someone discovered that a Rockefeller home (mansion) and range to make it was up for auction on a Sunday afternoon. Herman Teesch, my father, and two or three other members (please tell me the names) went to the auction, but the place is right for us and when the bidding was slow, said \$24,000, the gavel came down and we had a __ room stone building, a four spot in any caretakers house, with 24 acres of land containing a rose garden, tennis court, lake, pine woods, trees and grass in the town of Greenwich. (Space here for further details of this magnificent place)

Now they had to tell the board of directors and Praeses of the Society. And that was a row. Fr. Assmuth said Kolping has no business running a summer home, it was absolutely not in the manual. Some directors followed his lead. However it was in a different state, so my father for H. and energy Kolping society (with the NY members who lived in CT being the minimum CT resident members of the CT Corporation) eventually NY Kolping "made a loan" of \$15,000 to the CT society to complete the purchase.

There are many, many stories to tell about "Greenwich" but they will have to be filled in another time, by other people. My most vivid memories are about the Saturday night entertainments in the library with Ludwig Mingus playing records (especially the tango) and people dancing. I was always with the Boy Scouts and stayed on the second floor which was like a barracks room.

Well that lasted into the 40's. But the place was hard to keep up. Even though Max Reitter and others cut the grass regularly with a Gravely mower, scrub trees begin growing in the far reaches of the lawn. Four great white wooden columns over two stories high, at the street side of the stone house, even though painted by Max Grimm (by coming down from the roof in Boatswain's chair) were starting to decay. Major expenses were staring us in the face when the Greenwich Academy decided this was the place they needed to move their expanding private school. We accepted their offer to buy but with the express order to find another summer home, fast. If you have a pass through Greenwich, on Route 1, at the soldiers monument, take the fork west. On Maple Avenue, look for 200, the sign Greenwich Academy and you'll see our first summer home with its four white columns.

So a committee was formed and we traveled through New York and New Jersey, looking at places that were too far, too small, too big, too dry and with unsuitable buildings. Our then Praeses, Fr. Hartman O.S.A. was shown an issue of Preview magazine with an advertisement. That the former Seward estate in Montrose was for sale. The committee inspected it, negotiations proceeded and for cash \$50,000 plus perks, we had KOH.

The real estate broker who made the sale, as usual, notified newspapers of his work, so an article appeared that read, in effect, Catholic society buys estate in Westchester. Three days later a meeting was held by the society offices with His Eminence Cardinal Spellman. We learned to our complete amazement and utter chagrin that as a Catholic society, we should have consulted the archdiocese office before we contemplated the purchase because of an arrangement in effect about real estate taxes in Westchester. So with our promise not to apply for tax exemption as a Catholic society and with a modern set of Corporation By Laws (which had been all in German up to that point) we were restored to good grace in the Diocese. That is how we learn that we are not just some isolated group of ex-foreigners but an essential part of the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York.

This summer home was acquired in 1954 and it did not take long for members to start putting it in order for use. The real estate taxes were about \$3000, per year so there were fund-raising events begun right away. Mother's Day dinner, picnic in August, schlachtfest in fall.

Kolping, who let me know about the event and suggested we attend together.


