THE FRITZ GEBHARDT MURDER CASE submitted by Martin A. Kelly

Murder trials have captivated public interest from time immemorial. Most recently, in America, the O.J. Simpson, Casey Anthony and "Son of Sam" cases have arrested public curiosity.

So it was in 1935, New York City, that the murder of a German national, Dr. Fritz Gebhardt, and his German-American paramour, Vera Stretz, made Tabloid headlines. Gebhardt was a playboy, even at 43, with a wife and two daughters in Germany. Having been decorated as a flyer in the Red Baron's squadron in World War I, he, later, earned the Ph.D. degree in economics. His brilliance made him a welcomed guest in business and political circles but the flaw in his persona was his superiority complex (ther mensch) which made him feel exempt from laws.

His "freundin", was, on the other hand, a work-a-day young lady who inherited \$35,000 from her mother's insurance, and who wanted "to live". They met on a Caribbean Cruise and his charm enthralled her.


Then, she realized that their romance was going nowhere and she determined to avenge herself for his perverse ideas. Using a 32 cal. revolver, she shot and mortally wounded her gigolo in their trendy Beekman Towers apartment house.

She stood charged with murder; but, for her defense attorney, she had Sam Leibowitz, the slickest lawyer in town. Using every ploy of argumentation, cross-examination, and dramatic, he portrayed her as Gebhardt's sex slave. The enactment of this role won her the title of "Weeping Widow" by the press. The jury delivered a verdict of "Not Guilty; and, thanking her courtroom supporters, who included actress Tallulah Bankhead, she left to live out her life in obscurity.

So why are we intrigued by these macabre incidents? To see that justice is done...the next victim might be one of us!

THE NEW ROMAN MISSAL submitted by JACK McGEE



Words are important, because they are our stumbling attempts to speak the WORD in our response to the Father. The Father speaks the Word, which is the Son and the Son speaks back. This Word became flesh and, in our liturgy, this Word made flesh is our definitive response back to God. All the words we use in liturgy, in prayer, are our stumbling attempts to join the Word in his definitive response to the Father. This is why liturgy is so important. It is the dialogue of the Father and the Son, which is a dialogue of love and self-gift. Our dialogues in the liturgy are also dialogues of love and self-gift.

New translations are actually the Church's concern to inculturate the liturgy more fully into our American culture so that the culture might be transformed by the Gospel as proclaimed more clearly now in the liturgy.

It's important to understand the reason also for using the vernacular as opposed to Latin. The importance of the vernacular is not pedagogical-that the prayers may instruct the people about Church and God, but rather that the people might engage more fully in the act of worship, making it wholly their own.

There are also several reasons for having a new translation of the Latin original. For one, the current English translation that we use in the liturgy actually has a much reduced vocabulary compared to the Latin original.

There are also some deficiencies in the current translation that it is hoped the new translation will remedy.

The new translations are not perfect. Indeed none of our words will be perfect in the great effort to join in the dialogue of the Father and the Son. But they are richer in theology, in scriptural allusion, in metaphors and in lively images. And they will be closer to what the rest of the Catholic world is already praying in other languages. And they will be closer to what the Catholic world-saint and sinner alike-has prayed through the centuries. That kind of communion is worth it!

T.V. NEWS: "BLUE BLOODS" RETURNS [from the Catalyst]

One of the few TV shows on the broadcast networks to treat Catholicism fairly is the CBS hit, "Blue Bloods," starring Tom Selleck.
