

Stories of Interest

The Richard Sorge Mystery submitted by Martin A. Kelly



The greatest espionage coup of World War II was carried out by a German. But it didn't help the Germans, since he was spying for the other side.

Richard Sorge (1895-1944) was born in Prussia to mixed parentage. His father was German and his mother Russian.

The First World War broke out in 1914, and Sorge, barely 20 years old, was inducted

into the Kaiser's Imperial Army. He was wounded and hospitalized, and while recuperating he fell under the influence of a left-leaning physician and nurse. Sorge regained his health and was discharged from the army, but his political views became Socialistic.

A man of great intelligence, he became a foreign correspondent for the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung and was stationed in Tokyo. This, however, was a cover for his real mission, which was as the Soviet master spy in the Japanese capital.

Relations between Russia and Japan were antagonistic: they both were expansionists. Japan desired to be imperialist like England and France; Russia, to be the totalitarian leader of the world workers. When Japan joined the Axis, along with Germany and Italy, Russia wanted to know

how Japan would react in case Germany invaded Russia. With close contacts in the German embassy, Sorge learned that Japan would not attack Russia but would attack American, British, and Dutch possessions in the Pacific. Of course it would neutralize the American navy first.

On June 23, 1941, Hitler attacked Russia and had high hopes he would route their armies. German forces reached Moscow, but their generals were dismayed that more and more Russian forces blocked their advance. These were the "Asiatic" armies which Sorge had assured Moscow were not needed against the Japanese.

This was the high point of Axis aggression. The war was not over: $3\frac{1}{2}$ more years of hard fighting laid ahead, but the tide of battle had changed.

In 1942, Sorge was arrested after a tip from the peeved father-in-law of one of Sorge's Japanese agents aroused the suspicions of Japanese counter-intelligence. A network of over 50 spies including a high-ranking official were arrested, tried for treason, and executed.

Russia disclaimed knowing anything about Sorge, but twenty years later it posthumously awarded him its highest honors.

In retrospect a puzzle remains: if the Nazis placed so much faith in one's German ancestry as an index of loyalty, why was Sorge, who was half Russian, placed in such a highly sensitive position?
