Pope Benedict XVI will be coming to the U.S. for a visit. His trip is planned for April 15th to the 20th. On his arrival in New York, he will address the members of the United Nations Assembly. His visit will include a trip to view "Ground Zero." His religious participation will be with the New York Archdiocese of New York, now celebrating it's bicentennial—200 years of the founding of the Catholic Church in New York. We are also celebrating a personal jubilee. Cardinal Egan will be honored, announcing the Fiftieth Anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. One of the high points of the Pope's personal visit to New York will be Mass at the Yankee Stadium. After his arrival in New York, he will visit the White House, as well as the National Catholic Cathedral.

HEINE'S MONUMENT IN THE BRONX

statue dedicated to the famous German Heinrich poet. Heine, stands in the Bronx. It shows the pagan goddess Lorelei, subject of Heine's best-known poem, astride on outcropping of rock, singing, as it were, her bewitching tune. The enchantress, legend has it, lured seamen, plying the Rhine, to watery graves. How the sculpture found its

resting spot in South Bronx is a story that ought to be told.

Heinrich Heine was born in Dusseldorf, Germany in 1797, the child of Jewish parents. Anti-Semitism was rife and blocked his career ambitions in law or government service. The ruling sector was greatly influenced by Prussia and was reactionary. Even Heine's conversion to Lutheranism did not improve his status.

He was a prolific writer and journalist. He always championed social justice and became associated with leading progressives or reformers of his day. However, the overseers in Germany blacklisted his works, and he fled to Paris in 1831 where he enjoyed comparative literary freedom of expression.

Heine's works attracted a wide audience and were translated in many languages. One of his greatest admirers was Empress Elizabeth of Austria. His works, of which "Lorelei" is the best known, reflect sentimentalism versus reality and need for social reform.

When the Revolution of 1848 failed to bring change, many German liberals fled to America where they worked for liberal ideals including the abolition of slavery. Heine became bed ridden with a spinal ailment in 1848 and could not flee with the other reformers. He died in 1856.

As a memorial to Heine's genius, his friends commissioned the sculpture Ernst Herter (1846-1917) to create this magnificent statue. They intended to have it erected in Dusseldorf, the town of his birth, but the city council declined the honor on political grounds. The logical location to place it then was in New York City where many of his colleagues had found a haven. In 1899, the fountain was dedicated in Joyce Kilmer Park, at Grand Concourse and 161st Street, in the Bronx.

The Heinrich Heine Fountain (also known as the Lorelei Fountain) honors the German poet, writer, and social dissident Heinrich Heine (1797-1856), whose poem Die Lorelei immortalized the mysterious creature of romantic legend. The sculptural group, carved out of white Tyrolean marble, depicts Lorelet, a German mythical figure seated on a rock in the Rhine River among mermaids, dolphins, and seashells. According to Jegend, the maiden was transformed into a siren after throwing herself into the river. She could be heard singing from a rock along the river, her voice hypnotizing sailors to sleep, and then to their death. The bas-reliefs around the pedestal include a profile of Heine. Other decorative and allegorical motifs include a frog, a bird, and a skull symbolizing mortality. The fountain was purchased by a committee of German-Americans in 1893 and dedicated at the south end of what was then known as Grand Concourse Plaza on July 8, 1899. It was moved to the park's north end in 1940. In 1999 the monument was restored through the Municipal Art Society's Adopt-A-Monument Program, with \$310,000 as a gift from the Anna-Maria and Stephen Kellen Foundation. It was relocated to its original position in a newly landscaped setting in the south end, funded by Bronx Borough President Fernando Ferrer and Council Member Pedro G. Espada. The rededication ceremony was held on the centennial of the original installation, July 8, 1999, with a keynote speech by Wolfgang Scheffler, Deputy Mayor of Dusseldorf in Germany.
